

EXTENSION WORK REACHES PEOPLE

SCOPE COMPRISES MANY LECTURES AND CLASSES

YEAR'S GROWTH ENORMOUS

Portland Railway Groups, Library Courses, Southern Oregon Classes, and Correspondence Department Working.

"That a state University should reach not only those who can come to its place of learning, but also should reach out to all classes of people in every part of the state," is the fundamental principle underlying the work of the Extension department of the University. This year the department is doing about 5 times the work that it has done in any other previous year. It reaches people, who for various reasons cannot attend the University, through the Correspondence school; through these lectures at which from 40 to 400 people are touched; about 6000 people will be reached by means of the teachers' institutes, including practically every teacher in Oregon, and a large number are reached by means of extension classes and courses being carried on in every part of the state. Those engaged in the work say that the people are eagerly craving for such educational facilities. We receive letters every day from different people, organizations and communities, and find it very difficult to comply with all requests for lecture courses, etc." said Miss Mozelle Hafr.

Classes in Portland.
The English classes being conducted by Mrs. Parsons and Miss Perkins are growing rapidly. During the past week Dr. Rebec has been organizing engineering classes in Portland among the shop employees and whoever are interested. This week will be registration week and in a very short time the classes will be in full operation. There is a great demand for these classes and great results are expected. These classes will meet four nights a week and will be conducted by Professors Frink, McAllister, Dearborn, Adams and Dr. Winger.

Public Library Courses.
The department has made available lectures from the regular faculty for public library courses anywhere in the state, without expense to the library or to the hearers. Salem has already arranged for a series of lectures which will be run to the close of the college year and three or four lectures weekly have been arranged for the Portland libraries to Jan. 20. Coos Bay, North Bend, Marshfield, Bandon, Coquille and Myrtle point are endeavoring to take advantage of this offer. Two lectures by members of the faculty has already been arranged for several Coos county towns and the arrangement for other places will probably be completed by the last of November.

The department also provides the advice of experts, free, for a great variety of community problems, dealing with municipal government administration or any problems with which municipalities have to contend. The services of Prof. D. C. Sowers of Columbia University are specialized along these lines.

Prof Young has classes in Sociology at Ashland, Medford and Jacksonville are progressing nicely.

The first Extension school will be started in Pendleton the last of this week. This work is in connection with the High School. Wednesday morning Dr. Hodge will begin the series of lectures. Friday evening Dr. Rebec will speak and Saturday Dr. Schafer.

In all the University, is endeavoring to make itself available to all classes of people.

It is the aim to reach all the people of the community as well as the school children by these extension schools. Next week a similar school will be started at Milton and in January they will be started in Ashland, Medford and Klamath.

The scope of the work of the Extension Department:

1. Extension classes—English, Engineering, Portland, Sociology, Ashland, Medford, Jacksonville, Prospective classes, Psychology—Gold, HMI, Glendale; Sociology, Grants Pass; Education, Salem; Psychology, Portland.
2. Lecture courses. Courses already in operation. 1. Portland Branch Libraries; 2. Salem Library; 3. Forest Grove. Arrangements under way—Dallas, McMinnville, Newberg, Glendale and Ashland.
3. Single Lectures.
4. Extension Schools—1st, Pendleton, November 19-22.
5. Correspondence Study Courses.

DR. C. F. HODGE STARTS FLY SWATTING CAMPAIGN

Tells of Cases He Has Seen Where Flies Were Thick As Clouds

The State of Oregon can rid itself of flies," is the belief of Dr. C. F. Hodge, of the Extension Department of the University. Dr. Hodge is planning a great campaign against the fly in Oregon to be carried on next spring with the help of every man, woman and child in the state. A small pamphlet telling of the danger from flies, how the premises

about the home may be made sanitary, and giving a simple explanation of how to make a fly-trap will be sent to every school child in the state.

Dr. Hodge says, "The fly is a universal evil, but with a little effort and care it can be eliminated." If the right precautions are taken, screen windows and doors are unnecessary. We should screen the fly in, instead of screening ourselves away from the fly."

That this proposed campaign is not impractical and impossible is well demonstrated by the experiences of Eugene communities in the east and most especially the experience of the Crown mines in Jacksonville in South Africa.

"Here the flies are so thick that they form large black clouds." The

The campaign is now being carried on and from the last reports the flies are being practically eliminated.

In many sections of the United States these motorcycle patrolmen are also proving very valuable. In Kansas there is a well organized motorcycle patrol which not only keeps a lookout for violators of the speed laws but also aids in trailing robbers or criminals of any sort. The automobile Legal society of Massachusetts

has employed nine motorcycle scouts during the past summer. These have not only lessened speeding along the country roads, but in many instances have proven Good Samaritans to motorcyclists in distress. Detroit, Mich., is also considering employing a squad of motorcycle officers to patrol the country highways.
