Then when everyone was comfortable, with their cob pipes going, the air turning blue with smoke, and their arms lame from hearty hand-shaking, the program commenced.

Dancers Contest.

Every fraternity house, the Dorm club, and the non-fraternity men were asked to choose two men for a 'ragging' stunt. Riggs and Sweet of the Alpha Tau Omega pulled off a no-rules boxing and wrestling match, clad in long raincoats like two "Jack-the-grabbers." This match was far from bloody. Pobst played low, sad music during most of the bout.

TANK OPENING IS POSTPONED

TILE LAYING DECIDED ON BY REGENTS TAKES MORE TIME

DATE NOW AFTER VACATION

Women's Entrance Being Made and Dressing Room Will Be Provided for Co-ed Mermaids Who Will Use Plunge.

Once more the opening of the swimming pool has been postponed to a later date, this time until after the Christmas vacation. "Anyway we can regard our first swim, as in the nature of a Christmas present from the state," is the way in which the optimistic students look at the announced delay. The pool proper is all finished and ready for the water to be turned in, but the board of Regents has decided to lay a tile floor over the floor of the entire room, thus causing the delay. At first, it was decided to do this extra work during the Christmas vacation, but due to the fact the work will take a longer time than the vacation will allow, those in charge have decided to commence, as soon as the material arrives, so it will be impossible for the students to use the tank while the work is in progress.

There is a large amount of speculation, as to who will use the tank

first, the women or the men. According to Trainer Hayward, the women of the University will probably be allowed the use of the tank Monday of each week. In the event that the tank will be filled for the first time on Saturday and Sunday, the men will thus be excluded from being the first to take a plunge.

using the pool without interfering with the rest of the gymnasium, and the making of a dressing room in the west end of the room. This room will be set off by a curtain, stretched on rods.
