ORGANIZATIONS OUTSIDE CONFERENCE WANT GAMES

OLYMPIC CLUB ON THE LIST

However, Walker Says Schedule Is Already Full and Any Other Contests Will Be Taken on Only as Practice Games.

The Varsity basketball team is well supplied with outside games if it cares to take advantage of them according to graduate-manager Dean Walker.

"I have received a number of challenges from outside teams," said Walker yesterday. "It is evident that there are a number of organizations outside the conference that would like to pit their teams against us. Some of these games will be played as practice games but on account of the shortness of the season we will not be able to take advantage of as many of them as we would like."

The basketball schedule has this year been arranged so as to make the season short, and consequently, after our season is once started it will be crowded with basketball games. The more important games come in February and this month is now so full that it will practically be impossible to play any more games, except some easy ones.

"Among the challenges received are some from such outside organizations as the Olympic club of San Francisco, Roslyn Y. M. C. A. at Roslyn, Washington, Salem, Yellow Jack-Yellow Jackets, Silverton Commercial club, Multnomah club, and Gonzaga college at Spokane.

"The Olympic club wrote that their team was going to make a trip into this country but as they mentioned no definite date it remains to see whether they go through at a time when we will be able to play them without interfering with our conference schedule. We have games scheduled with the Multnomah club and the game with the Silverton club was postponed and will probably be played later. Other challenges will probably not be taken up unless they
