Dr. Joseph Schafer speaks at Crow on February 13.

\$100 PRIZE UP FOR BEST GOOD CITIZENSHIP ESSAY

Intercollegiate Civic League
Contest Open to All
Undergraduates

A prize of \$100 is offered by the intercollegiate Civic League to the college student writing the best essay on the following subject: "What training, whether resulting from a college course of study, from extra curricular activities, or from both, would, in your judgment, best fit an under-graduate in an American college to undertake the duties of citizenship?"

The competition for this prize, it is announced, will be open to all undergraduates in American colleges and universities. The essays must be typewritten in duplicate and in the hands of the secretary of the Intercollegiate League, E. M. Salt, of Columbia University New York City, not later than May 15, 1914. Five thousand words is the limit which will govern the length of the essays submitted.

FIRST AID LECTURES START FEBRUARY 25

Six Eugene Doctors Scheduled
to Speak Before University Men

A series of six weekly "First Aid to the Injured" lectures has been arranged by the Y. M. C. A. and starts Wednesday evening, February 25.

The lectures will be as follows: "The Physical Efficiency of the Individual," by Coach Hugo Bezdek, February 25; "Injuries and Emergencies of Indoor and Outdoor Sports," by Dr. Eberle Kuykendall, March 4. This lecture deals with gymnasium, baseball, football, boating, automobiles, camping and summer outings; "Injuries to the Eye, Ear and Nervous System," by Dr. James B. Taylor, March 11. Dr. Taylor will discuss bruises, strains, sprains, dislocations and fractures; "Injuries in Which the Skin Is Broken," by Dr. Beardsley, March 18. This lecture deals with wounds, hemorrhage, internal hemorrhage, nose bleed, abdominal wounds and wounds in which foreign bodies remain; "Unconsciousness, Partial and complete Poisoning," by Prof. Edmondson, March 25. Prof. Edmondson will tell about shocks, electric shocks, fainting, alcoholic poisoning, apoplexy and injury to the brain, sunstroke and heat exhaustion, freezing, suffocation and poisoning; "Care of Partially Drowned Persons," by Prof. John Bovard, April 1.

BISHOP SCADDING WILL VISIT CAMPUS FEB. 16 Head of Episcopal Church Will Speak at Numerous Meetings

Bishop Charles Scadding, head of the Episcopal diocese of Oregon, will arrive Monday to be in residence upon the campus among the students and faculty for the week ending February 22. He will address the Y. M. C. A. meeting Wednesday evening, February 18, and will be the speaker at the Vesper services Sunday afternoon, February 22. His conference hours will be spent partly at the Y. M. C. A. Book Exchange and partly at the Y. W. C. A. Bungalow.

Bishop Scadding was a speaker at the University last year and during his stay became well known to the students. Already invitations are being extended to him from various fraternities and sororities to visit them.

He is the second in a series of religious leaders who will be in residence on the campus. Dr. Henry Marcotte was the first.

LAB GETS NEW APPARATUS

Electric Calorimeter For Chemistry
Only One in Oregon.

A new electric calorimeter, or bomb apparatus, recently installed in Prof. O. F. Stafford's chemistry laboratory, has the distinction of being the only one of its kind in the state.

There are two gas calorimeters in Oregon, however, one owned by the Portland Gas and Coke Co., and the other owned by the Oregon State Utilities Commission.

Professor Stafford's assistant says chemists from other parts of the state are planning trips here to use it.

Illinois' track team has not lost a dual meet in its gymnasium since 1904, nor on any field for four years.

Western Reserve plans to build a new gymnasium at a cost of \$125,000 to replace the present building which was built in 1888.

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
