LESSONS FROM THE MIX

On the whole, last Saturday's Underclass Mix was satisfactory. It served the purpose for which the Mix was instituted—that of a safety valve to the natural rivalry developed between the two lower classes each fall. There was plenty of good sport for both spectators and contestants, and no casualties.

With this, the fourth Mix, the idea may be fairly said to have passed the experimental stage and to have won a place among campus institutions. Each year the program has differed radically from those which have gone before. Various events and "stunts" have been tried and discarded as lacking in the essentials of a good interclass "scrap." From the experience of four years, it should be possible for future Junior committees to adopt the ideas which have proved successful, and stage a far more interesting Mix than any that has gone before.

For one thing, most of Saturday's contests, while highly absorbing to the participants, were unsatisfactory from the spectator's standpoint. The flag rush, for example. From the inside it was the most exciting of all the events; but to the crowd it was merely an agitated conglomeration of arms, legs and other members.

The reason for the popularity of the sandbag contest and tie-up with the spectators is that they are fought in the open.

Saturday's Mix was also partly demoralized by the shifting of the arena from Kincaid Field to the campus, so that the last two events, the water fight and tug-of-war, could be contested. We believe it is better to hold the entire program on the field, especially since it is no longer possible to adjourn to the duck pond for the tug-of-war.

We also believe that the interest in the Mix on the part of both spectators and contestants will be intensified if the program is cut down to three or four events which have stood the test and have proved real "thrillers." The sandbag contest and the tie-up seem to have qualified. The most successful of all contests from every point of view, however, was the pushball battle which was the "headliner" of the Mix the first two years. It gives every man in both classes an opportunity to distinguish himself; the contest itself is exciting; the spectators cannot lose sight of the ball, however thick the fray; and there is an absence of the personal jousts such as developed Saturday.

But here a difficulty arises: in the past two years the managers of the Mix have been unable to obtain a pushball. It costs money for that much ball, and the owners of the only two in the Northwest now refuse to take the risk of loaning them without the protection of a larger bond than the Junior class has felt able to pay.

Why should not the Student Body own a pushball? The saving in trouble and expense to the Mix managers would offset its cost in time. If necessary, the money could be raised by a special campaign—perhaps one single benefit entertainment. Here is a pretext for reviving the late lamented County Fair, which went so far toward making the Y. W. C. A. bungalow possible—and which went so far in other ways.

In the issue of the Emerald for Tuesday of this week, an editorial states, "We have received a suggestion that a panoramic photograph be taken of the Student Body. Unfortunately, of course, it was not possible to print this picture, and so its permanent value was lost.

But let us stage another successful picture this year and keep its value. And we can do that through the reasonableness of one photographer who has said to me, "I will make a panorama picture of the Student Body of the University forty inches long and

eight inches wide and make the price fifty cents a picture. I will also make all the necessary preparations for taking the picture, so it will not require more than ten minutes of the students' time." Could anything more reasonable than this be asked?

I spoke to administrative officers concerning the project and they heartily endorsed it and said they would back it. Asked as to when they would suggest a date for the taking of the picture, they thought the first Wednesday in November would be a suitable time. The first Wednesday of each month at assembly hour is the regular time for the meeting of the classes. Then with all the classes assembled, it would be an easy matter to march en masse to the selected spot and with the faculty have a picture taken that to each of us would be invaluable.

All that is now needed is the co-operation of each student. Let's co-operate and on November 4th have a picture taken that means so much and costs so little.
