It is a most courteous practice, one which makes a Freshman feel at home, and which contributes greatly to the comradeship of the students. But whether or not the present Freshman class look upon the green cap as a distinction or a persecution is not the question. It is approved by student sentiment, and that is enough. Every class which has entered the University since its adoption has worn it, and those classes contained possibly as good men as does the present first-year brigade. As we said at the outset, we do not mean to denounce the class of 1918. Thus far it has acquitted itself well. It has shown good spirit as a body, and it has a good representation in student activities. But it seems inevitable that there be a few refractory members who do their utmost to get the whole class "in bad." In the present instance, it appears that these individuals have been encouraged in their course by those who should give better advice. It is said that they have been told that they do not have to wear green caps unless they feel like it. To the Freshman class we would say that such counsel, from whatever source it may come, is dangerous. It is true that there is no faculty edict requiring Freshmen to wear the caps, but there is a determined student sentiment demanding it. 


