Professor Barnett has written several articles dealing with political science. In 1907 he wrote "The Executive Control of the Legislature," which appeared in the American Law Review. In 1908 appeared the "Delegation of Legislative Power by Congress to the States," in the American Political Science Review. In the year following, he wrote a publication in the American Law Review, on the "Delegation of Federal Jurisdiction to State Courts by Congress." In 1910 Professor Barnett wrote "The Brounds of Pardon in the Courts," for publication in the Yale Law Journal. In 1912 there appeared two other articles in the American Political Science Review, namely, "The Operation of the Recall in Oregon," and "The Forestalling the District Primary in Or-
