

DEBATE STILL IN AIR

Reed Now Wishes to Debar Women From Triangular Forensic Meeting.

Women are again to be barred from the triangular debate. Reed College has refused to sign the contract unless three details contained in it are modified. Those concerning women participating in the contest, both teams traveling away from the college, and the pooling of expenses, are the objectionable items.

The following is an extract of a letter from Horace Miller of Reed College to Cloyd Dawson, secretary of the Forensic Council:

"We do not favor a team of men debating a team of women or a team of men debating a team composed of a woman and a man. According to the last press report you have come to this same conclusion, so it should be easy to come to an agreement whereby the men who are interested in debate at Reed College can meet the men of the other colleges."

The matter of the teams leaving the college is declared to be unwise because the student body would not lend their support unless they heard one of their own teams in action. According to the original plan, Reed and Oregon should have met at Corvallis.

Corvallis so far has not objected to any of the plans outside of wanting the contract for more than one year.

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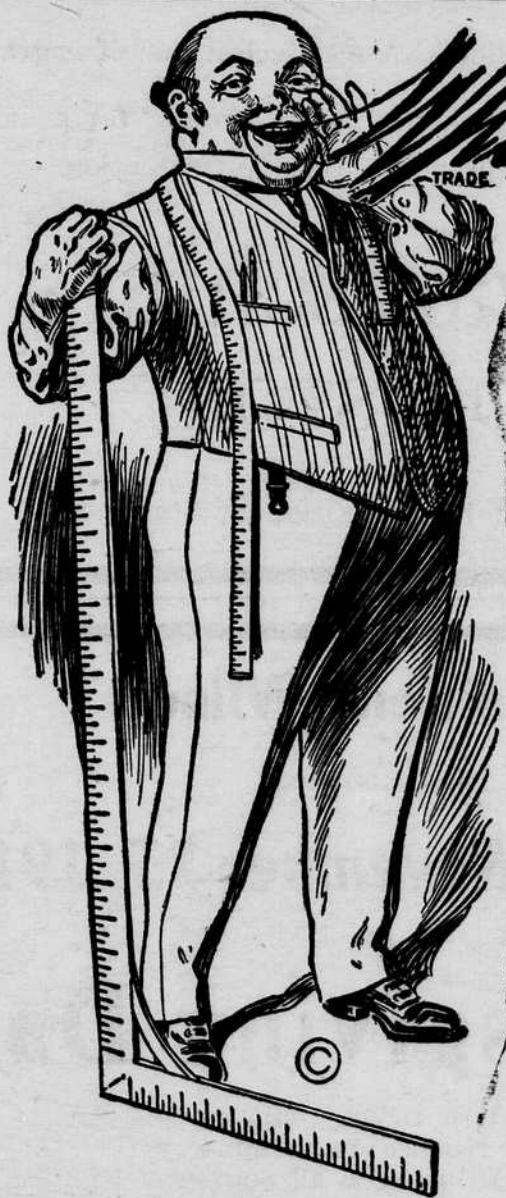
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
