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Y. M. C. A. DEPUTATION GOES ON LONG TRIP

Association Squad Will Visit Five Towns in Douglas and Jackson Counties.

The most extensive deputation trip ever undertaken by the Y. M. C. A. is scheduled to start tomorrow morning at 6:10 for the southern Oregon towns of Riddle, Roseburg, Central Point, Medford and Ashland with Walter Dimm, Lynn McCreedy, Glenn Wheeler, James McCallum, Gerry Watkins, Arlo Bristow, J. D. Foster, Louise Allen and Mary Gillies as members of the deputation.

Basketball games will be played with the local town and high school teams. The proceeds from these games are expected to cover all the expenses of the delegation and if the people in the southern part of the state are as enthusiastic about everything connected with the University of Oregon as Secretary Foster testified to during his last trip down there the receipts will be more than ample. Games have been contracted for at all the towns except Grants Pass.

Vaudeville Is Scheduled

The educational part of the trip will consist in speaking before the townspeople on live, up-to-date subjects. To accommodate the audiences the use of 20 churches, four high schools and one theatre has been arranged for. Some songs and a few vaudeville hits will also be thrown in.

Wherever possible the delegation will assist in any University rally which is being held in the towns visited and an effort will be made to make the dates coincide. The deputation will be in Roseburg December 17-19, Central Point and Medford, December 20; Ashland, December 21-23, and on the return, Central Point will again be visited, December 24-26, and Medford the night of December 27-28.

Plans are under way for a similar trip to the northern part of the state some time next spring. This will be to Portland, Hood River and The Dalles.
