J. G. Richardson, Corporation Examiner, Says Oregon Statnte Is Best in Union.

How the "blue sky" laws of Oregon enforced through the corporation commissioner's office at Salem protect the stock buyer from the professional fleecer. was explained to Prof. F. G. Young's class in state administration by J. G. Elichardson, corporation examiner, in Guild hall yesterday morning.

"Oregon has the best blue sky laws in the Union," said Mr. Richardson. "They were patterned after the Kansas law of 1911, the first legislation of this kind ir this country. Our law does not assize the investor that he will make money on his investment, but it insures him against the unscrupulous, robbing promoter."

Fights Bogly Business.

Here are a few instances which Mr. Richardson cited where risky promotion schemes have been nipped in the bud by the office in Salem: Three men agreed to enter into a contract with a man on the coast who had a little mining property with a 75 foot tunnel bored into a hil. They were to pay him 7\$,000 for his workings, provided that they could organize their company.

"They came to me with this proposition," explained Mr. Richardson. "That they should be allowed to incorporate and sell 1,000,000 shares of stock. Then the mine would be turned over to the company for half the capital derived from the sale of these shares. The other half of the money from the transfer of the stock would be used to operate the holdings. The price per share would be Dave Wilson, Ray Mondhallen, Lucien \$1.00.

"Their intentions were to pay the \$7,000 to the owner of the property out made on the selling of the stock.

'Naturally those three men were mighty disgusted when I told them that Lombard, Walter Cressey, Knighton we, could not grant permission for the forming of such a country. They went to an eastern state where there were no 'blue sky' laws to do some organizing. Once in a while I get letters from people back there asking about those three men. I take great pleasure in telling my inquirers about the scheme they tried to work in Oregon."

### Get-Rich-Quick Scheme Nipped.

Another promoters' proposition that was stopped before it got underway was When 100 contract holders had paid their Hedges, Irwin Hartley, first installment purchaser number one Flegal, Albert Bowles, Ralph Boyd \$1,000.

"I took a pencil and figured that the plan would lose the contract holders just \$11,000 each year," declared Mr. Richardson. "Needless to say, we did not issue a permit for the proposed com-

"A short time ago several Portland men wanted to incorporate an organizatior. They wished to issue a bond of \$25,000 on assets which we determined were worth about \$8,000.

"Those individuals are also radically against the Oregon 'blue sky, law, now, for we could do nothing but turn them down."

"Stocks and bonds are two different things. One is gambling more or less when he buys stock, but when he buys bonis, he is supposed to be getting the full worth of his money. That is why the promoters of various schemes must be watched."

Mr. Richardson said that though "blue sky laws were of recent date, corporation laws were in operation several hundred years before the birth of Christ. Such laws were in the general statutes of the Romans in 452 B. C., according to the speaker.
