UNCLE SAM DECREES NO COMPULSORY DRILL

Will Be None Until War Department Furnishes Officer and Equipment.

War Department Cannot Spare Officers or Guns From Mexican Border.

No compulsory drill for underclassmen, at present, at least.

When Uncle Sam decided that American soldiers, officers, and guns were needed on the Mexican border, he also decided that the University of Oregon should go without military drill for an indefinite time. So, in spite of the fact that the board of regents of the university voted on June 2 to introduce compulsory military drill this year for underclassmen, there will be no such drill. The war department cannot spare either an officer or equipment.

On September 12, Adjutant-General McCain, located at Washington, D. C., wired President Campbell that nothing can be done at present. "On account of present condition Mexican border not know how soon officer can be spared for detail University," the telegram read.

The will of the board of regents will of course be carried out as soon as the government can send an officer to take charge and equipment with which to work.
