Figures received from the office of the registrar today show that 75 of the regular University students came back for Summer School this year. This is 32 more than there were in 1915, as there were then only 43.

The numbers of candidates for degrees of B. A., B. S., M. A., and M. D., are 51, 2, 7, and 1, respectively. There were only 7 from outside the state, California, Washington, Idaho and South China being represented.

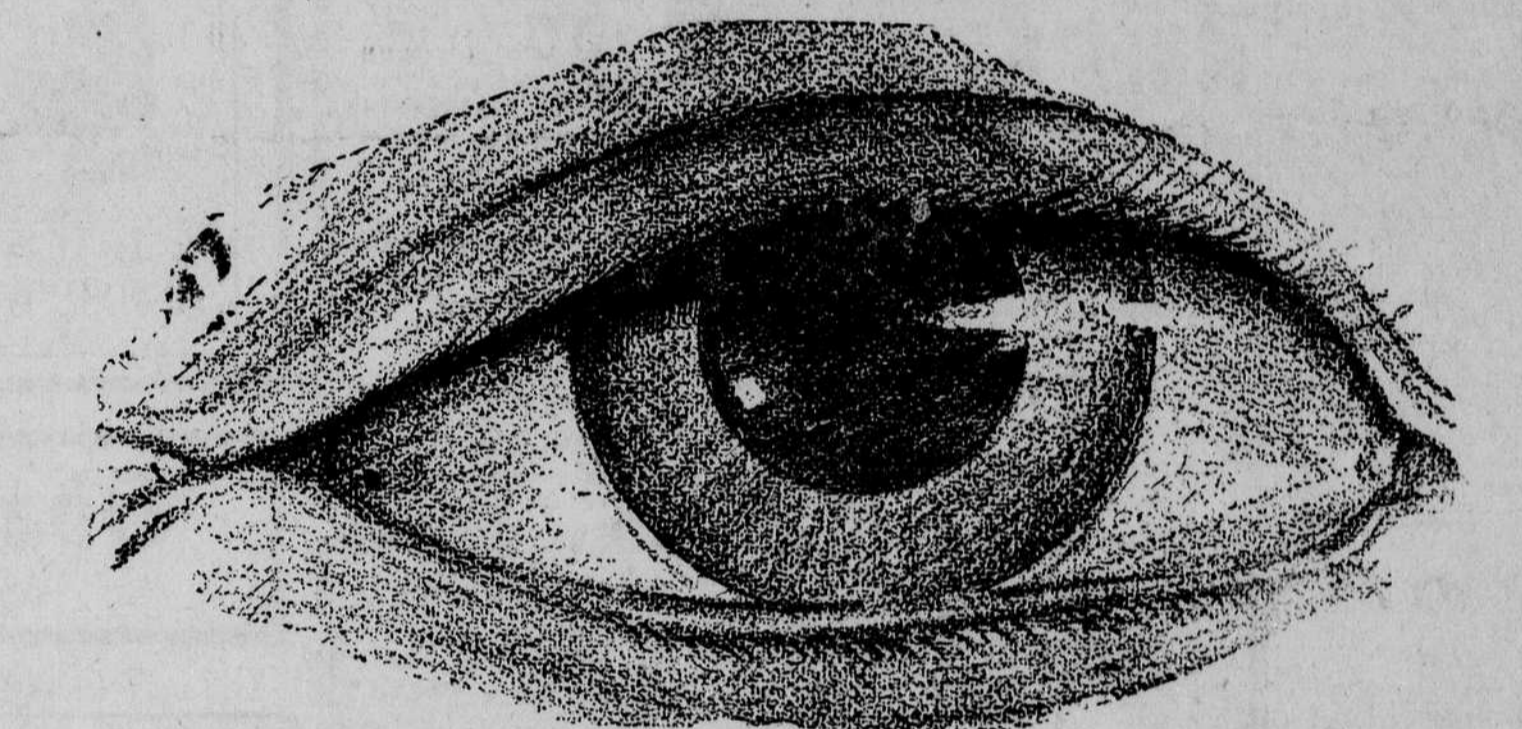
