Dr. W. B. Neal, a local physician, spoke to pre-medics majors Wednesday morning about the growing importance of diagnostic hospitals. He used the hospital of the Mayo Brothers in Rochester as an example. Dr. Neal's argument was that a number of physicians working together can get better results than one working alone, as the large number has an opportunity to specialize and become efficient in their own particular line, while one that tries to know everythng in the whole field of medcine cannot hope to be as good. counters between the underclassmen
