Coach Bezdek:—he says, "We have a great state." In 1906 "Bez" came to Oregon from starring on the University of Chicago eleven, and turned out a football machine that beat Washington and grabbed the northwest championship. He can do it again.

Captain Johnny Beckett and his fighting smile are known throughout western football. One was never seen without the other. Johnny was all northwest tackle for three years and last year received honorable mention in Walter Camp's All-American. He will play end so he can carry the ball. When the Captain's 191 pounds get into action watch out. And they do every play.

"Fighting Brick" Mitchell is one of the hardest tacklers in the conference. He is a good man to get away from the defensive halves. "Brick" comes back after every play. They coined the word "Jaz" to fit Brick.

Big Bill Snyder, the biggest thing on the team, though he weighs 198 pounds, he is one of the fastest men on the squad. He is a mountain on a tear in the running of interference and opens up the opponent's line for the back field plunges. When Bill stands in line he is hard to move.

Jake Ricley has a way of going over the opposing line and getting a hold of the backs that spoils lots of plays. He is steady, scrappy and a sure passer. For two years he has held down the Northwest berth at center. Jake takes some of the work away from the ends when they get started too slowly.

"Bart" Spellman, the man with the big nerve, has had several portions of hard luck in injuries but they can't seem to stop him much. "Bart" has not played a great deal of football but as one of the Multnomah players put it, "When Spellman gets set in that line he

is there to stay."

Lloyd Tegart, one half of the Beckett—Tegart combination that mused up so many plays for O. A. C. last year. He has to spear the forward passes that are thrown over. Lloyd learned his first football on the great Washington high team, that year three years ago when they cleaned up on the state.

"Kenny" Bartlett cannot or does not pull the grand stand stuff but he holds his own with the tackles and is in on the plays. It's pretty hard to get around right end. "Kenny" showed up strong against O. A. C. last year.

Shy Huntington, the boy that gives the signals. Shy kicked the place kick in the game with O. A. C. in 1914, that

Their section is located east of the Oregon rooters near the 30 or 40-yard line.


Many of the business men have reserved from three to five seats in this section.
