THE UNIVERSITY'S NEEDS.

It is yet early to prognosticate what the state legislature will do with the University's request for money. When President Campbell made the announcement of the financial crisis the University was in as a result of decrease of valuation in state taxable property it was then clearly seen that the legislature would have a difficult time in aiding the University as a result of the six per cent tax limitation measure recently passed by the state.

But in the spirit for which the University is noted the further announcement was made that if the legislature found that the broader interests of the state made it impossible to grant the University's request there would be no backbiting from the University and it would immediately retrench to come within its income, even though retrenchment meant a great hurt to the citizenship of the state. For of necessity the great retrenchment would come in the extension work. And at the same time it would be necessary to crowd the classrooms more and take a chance on the best faculty members being called elsewhere to more lucrative fields.

But this 29th assembly of state legislators seems to be a fairminded body, a capable body and one in whom the University can place its confidence in securing justice.

STAFF TO ISSUE BULLETIN

Physical Training Department Compiling Material on Work Done at Oregon.

The physical training staff is compiling a bulletin, the "Hygiene and Physical Professional Training for Women." The bulletin will be out some time in May.

"It will concern professional training entirely," explained Miss Mabel Cummings, head of the physical training department, "and will contain splendid cuts pertaining to physical training here, such as of the dancing class, indoor training work and of the women's gymnasium, showing the open air addition."

The bulletin will also contain a list of graduates of the department who are holding physical training positions. This list contains 22 people who have graduated from the department since 1912 and the positions vary from an instructor in the deaf and dumb school to supervisor of physical training.

"While attending the teachers' association during the Christmas holidays," said Miss Cummings, "I had an opportunity to speak to many of the principals under whom the former students are working and they all expressed the deepest satisfaction with the work which the graduates of this department are performing."

About 1200 copies of the bulletin will be issued and will be sent to high schools and colleges. According to Miss Cummings this will probably cause a greater demand for teachers who have graduated from this department by showing them the line of work which is being done here.

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TURNBULL A BALL FAN

New Journalism Professor Will Reach Eugene Jan. 26.

Letters of Congratulation Say He Has Reputation as Authority on Baseball.
