"I would not choose the most brilliant man in this room to be the leader 15 years from now," he declared, "because a quality of perseverance and a capacity for hard work are necessary and these are most often the attributes

"We all like to see stars and we admire the person who can draw circles all around us, but the man who believes in hard work and co-operation is the man who will make the democratic lead-

Mr. Robins told how in his own youth he went to Washington, D. C., a ragged ungainly boy, whose overall legs lacked six inches of covering up open country between the place where they left off and his shoes began; and how discouraged and disheartened he was there given the life that he needed, as an example of how little it takes to inspire
