**ORDER OF "O" ELECTS HONORARY MEMBERS**

Bezdek, Hayward, Shockley Unanimously Voted Into Organization.

Letter Men's Grades Will Be Compiled; Tri-Yearly Initiation Discussed.

Hugo Bezdek, William Hayward, and Edward Shockley were unanimously elected to honorary membership in the Order of "O" at the regular monthly meeting of the organization held last night in the men's gymnasium. Bezdek and Hayward have been honorary members since the order was founded; their election last night being a matter of form in accord with the wishes of the members.

Active steps to perfect the order and make it a big factor in handling all branches of athletics were started at yesterday's meeting. Three articles of the newly drawn constitution were passed upon. The remainder will be ready for approval at the next meeting in May.

The "O" men are determined to keep their scholarship up during the entire year. Coach Bezdek offered a suggestion that a man in each branch of sport attend to the grades of the men out for

that sport. The order acted favorably on the suggestion and will immediately get in touch with the faculty concerning the letter men's grades.

"I would like to see the grades of the "O" men compiled together at the end of each semester," said Coach Bezdek in commenting upon the matter. "I am quite sure they would measure up to the average house standings. It will be a big step in the furtherance of athletics."

President Martin Nelson has formulated a certificate of membership patterned after the one now awarded to the "C" men at Cornell. The order unanimously voted to buy the certificates which will be awarded at a nominal sum to any man who makes his letter in any major branch of athletics. The certificates will be on heavy paper suitable for framing, with a large block "O" in the center.

Plans were talked over for a tri-yearly initiation of the new members of the order, following the football, basketball, track and baseball seasons. The first initiation ceremonies will take place the latter part of May to welcome the new track and baseball athletes in the order.

John Beckett, chairman of the recent dance given at the Rainbow, reported a balance of five cents in the treasury.

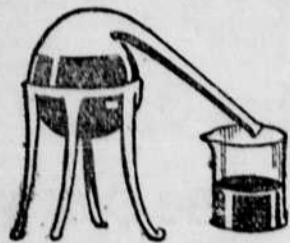
