

RESOLUTION ADOPTED SUPPORTING WILSON

Jaureguy, Watkins and Gilbert Give Talks; Hill-Tout Lauds Local Sentiment.

With the University men who have enlisted in the Coast Artillery corps. as honored guests, Oregon spirit has transferred itself from campus enthusiasm to national patriotism. Students and faculty alike have responded famously to the preparedness movement, and the entire scope of their feelings for the protection of our national rights was expressed in the crowded hall at assembly yesterday.


The program which had been prepared for the Greater Oregon movement was changed to that of expression of support to our government during the approach of a crisis, and a willingness of every one to do his part. Presided over by President Nicholas Jaureguy, himself a member of the Coast Artillery, the meeting was made one of consideration of service, service not only in a militory way but in all forms that will be of a benefit to ourselves and neighbors. The address was delivered by Hon. R. A. Booth of the Booth-Kelly Lumbar Co., Eugene, who has always shown a keen interest in the welfare of the University. Mrs. Booth has backed the University in every way, and was one of the promoters of the student loar fund.

In speaking on "What the Universtiy Student Can Do Throughout the State," Mr. Booch expressed great pleasure a seeing the patriotism of the student body. "Justice is greater than peace" was his keynote throughout. 





ALBANY SIGNS GLEE CLUB
