FIVE TO GET FURLOUGHS
FOR HOMECOMING VISIT

Several Members of Second Company
Will Be Allowed to Return
to Alma Mater.

Only five of the fifty students en-
listed in the second company Oregon
coast artillery stationed at Fort Stev-
ens will be permitted to return to the
University for Homecoming Saturday,
because of an army regulation which
prevents more than five per cent of any
command from being given furloughs at
the same time.

The information was received at the
president's office from Colonel C. C.
Hammond, commander of the fort, at
the mouth of the Columbia, in re-
sponse to a request made by the Uni-

versity that as many furloughs be grant-
ed to the old University men as possible
that they might return to their alma
mater for the Homecoming program.

Colonel Hammond wrote that he had
ordered that five of the Oregon men
in the second company be given fur-
loughs regardless of priority of fur-
lough privilege. Only former students
or graduates of the University will be
given furloughs from Second company
during the coming week-end.

Because of the favorable attitude tak-
en by the colonel, it is believed that a
much larger percentage of old Univer-
sity men scattered, a few men in a
company, in other branches of the ser-
vice will be able to return to the Uni-
versity this week.

Requests similar to that sent Colonel
Hammond have been sent to other com-
manders of training camps and forts in
Oregon and Washington.

There are about two hundred Uni-
versity men in military service, who are
now serving within visiting distance of
the University, either in Washington
or Oregon.
