CROSS-COUNTRY TEAM TO RACE AGGIES SELECTED

Parr, Lyle, Coleman, Mulkey and Jacobson Win in a Trial Run Monday.

Winners in the cross-country tryout held yesterday afternoon were Dwight Parr, William Lyle, "Dubbs" Mulkey, William Coleman, and Arthur Jacobson. The runners were taken over a new course yesterday by "Bill" Hayward, track coach, who went in advance of the men in his Ford.

William Lyle led yesterday's run until the final stretch, when Dwight Parr forged ahead of the ex-University of the Oregon man can run up to it the Oklahoma miler and came in first. Lyle set up a terrific pace and if the rest of the Oregon men can run up to it the Aggies are going to have some real opposition.

Arthur Jacobson, who finished fourth, is a former University of Montana man, this being his first year at Oregon. William Coleman and "Dubs" Mulkey who finished third and fourth respectively, are both old Oregon men. The course was three and seven-tenths miles long.

It has not been definitely decided just when the runners will be taken to Portland, if it is possible they will go tonight so that they may have the opportunity of practicing tomorrow upon the course in Portland.

The race in Portland will be held over a course consisting of three miles. The runners will start about a half hour before the time for the football game, making two laps around the Multnomah track and then start out over the hills of Portland. On their return to the Multnomah field, they will make another two laps around the track to the finish.

score shows was Oregon's from the start to the finish. Since that fateful day, O. A. C. has braced up, and since then Oregon has never been able to roll up a score equal to the one made in 1895.

Twice 33-0.

In 1898 and again in 1899 Oregon won the annual games by big scores. Both games were won by the same score—33 to 0. Oregon's team in 1899 was light, but superior team work coupled with the sensational playing of one or two stars, offset what the team was minus in weight.

The next highest score made by Oregon was in 1916, when Oregon's champion team that defeated the University of Pennsylvania at Pasadena, rolled up a 27 to 0 victory against the Aggies. Oregon has held O. A. C. from crossing her goal 13 times, whereas, Oregon has failed to score on O. A. C. but 4 times.

Aggies Win First

O. A. C. won her three games in 1894, 1897, and 1907. In 1894 which was the first game played between the rival schools, O. A. C. was victorious by a score of 16 to 0. In 1897 the Aggies defeated Oregon 26 to 8. This score is the largest that O. A. C. has ever been able to pile up against an Oregon eleven. Again for the third time and last time so far, O. A. C. succeeded in winning a victory in 1907.

In that year the team from the Corvallis school and the Eugene representatives were evenly matched. Neither team could carry the ball over the goal line. The only score was a place-kick successfully made by Carl Wolff, O. A. C.'s famous fullback. The final tally was 4 to 0. Goals from the field counting four points then. The game was played on Kincaid field. In the nine games played since then Oregon has been victorious in every one. In those nine games Oregon piled up a total score of 84 points to her rival's 13. No game was played in 1911.

Can Oregon Do It.

In 1897 O. A. C. was victorious, again ten years later, in 1907, the "Beaver" representatives scored a victory. Now the question is, will Oregon smash this ten-year jinx?

U. S. ARMY OFFICER TO PLAN DRILL HERE

Col. William Bowen to Arrive This Week to Arrange for Work; in Philippines for Many Years.

Close Government Connection May Bring Uniforms and Rifles to U. of O.

William H. C. Bowen, retired colonel in the United States army, will arrive Saturday to arrange for the military instruction work which will probably begin the first of next week. Colonel Bowen will be here all of December, and if Lieutenant-Colonel John Leader, of the British army, arrives, other arrangements will be made.

"Colonel Bowen comes here very highly recommended from the headquarters at San Francisco," said Secretary Onthank. "He is a West Point graduate and has had much army experience. He was colonel in the Philippines for many years, and was retired while there. Dr. W. D. Smith has seen him lately and speaks highly of him."

The colonel has been voluntarily assisting in the classes in military science at San Francisco, but has not been on active duty.

The University's connection with him will probably mean a close connection with the war department, according to Secretary Onthank and will mean that in a short time the University will probably get government aid, such as the other colleges have, in the form of uniforms and commutation.

"The arrival of Colonel Leader is so uncertain," said Mr. Onthank, "that we will go ahead and organize the work. Colonel Bowen will be here on Saturday so that the schedule can be worked out. For the work we will possibly get some standard army rifles so we will be able to have target practice."
