C. scorer gave Kasberger an error on the play, but as he did not get his mitts on the ball or was not set to field it, there is no rule that will substantiate this manner of recording the play. The second hit was a two bagger by "Dinty" Moore in the eighth inning. After getting to second on the hit "Dinty" stole third but died there as Young fanned for the third out.

Arm Bothers Jacobberger. Jacobberger pitched a good game for the Frosh but he was bothered with a sore arm that kept him from putting on his steam delivery. Nine hit's were recorded off of him and he issued free transportation to four and whiffed seven. McCart fanned twelve and walked only one batter. But 32 men faced the big Aggie in the entire nine

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iant fielding of Johnny Houston, the Frosh third sacker, who handled seven chances without a boot. He cut off several drives that were bound for the outfield and in all played a regular bang-

The victory on Saturday gives the O. A. C. Rooks two straight wins over the lemon-yellowers, as they won the game at Corvallis last week by the score of 7 to 4. This will probably wind up the season for the freshmen as no other games have been booked.
