\$4613 TOTAL SUM PLEDGED IN DRIVE

Adelaide Lake's Team Leads; Men Credited With \$1,-940: Women, \$1,359

From the reports of the members of the general campus committee for the united war work drive at a meeting held last night, the University is coming to the front in fine shape and has almost reached its quota. The grand total of pledges now amounts to \$4613.75.

Team one, under Captain Adelaide Lake, is ahead in pledges, having \$797.50 to their credit and 209 persons pledged. Team two, under Captain Ella Dews, received 180 pledges to the amount of

The six groups of team one reported as follows: Town girls from A to L, 48 pledges, \$151.50; Hendricks hall, units two and three, 60 pledges, \$210.50; Kappa Alpha Theta, 34 pledges, \$115; Kappa Kappa Gamma, 26 pledges, \$107; Gamma Phi Beta, 21 pledges, \$96.50; Alpha Phi, 20 pledges, \$117.

In team two the town girls from M to Z have 44 pledges and \$121; Hendricks hall, units one, four and five, 41 pledges and \$119; Delta Gamma, 21 pledges, \$67.50; Pi Beta Phi, 31 pledges, \$137; Delta Delta Delta, 14 pledges, \$57; Chi Omega, 16 pledges and 200. The total of the women's pledges is \$1359.

Three hundred and forty-three men of the S. A. T. C. who were solicited by committees in charge of "Nick" Carter and Ed Durno, pledged \$1940. This also Includes \$45 pledged by eleven men who are not in the military organization. In Company A, 147 men gave \$819.50; 130 In Company B, \$756.50; 55 in Company

The faculty have to their credit \$1314.75 with 106 signers of pledge cards. They had hoped to raise \$1600 and may reach that mark yet.

The \$6600 quota as first apportioned to the University was by a mistake figured on the 150 per cent basis instead of the 100 per cent. This brings the correct quota to be raised down to \$4750, which standard the University has almost

According to Dr. A. E. Caswell, chairman of the campus war fund drive, not all of the students have been reached. He estimated that 80 per cent have been solicited and feels confident that the others will swell the fund to the top.


