

OFFICERS ELECTED BY DEBATE FORUM

Ruth Graham, President Elect,
Speaks to Women on
Ideals of Society.

The Forum, women's debating society on the campus, held election of officers at its meeting Wednesday evening at 7 o'clock in Professor R. W. Prescott's room in the basement of Johnson hall, along with a general discussion of debate matters in preparation of the next round in the doughnut debate league.

The officers, who were all elected by a unanimous vote for the remainder of the college year are: Ruth Graham, president; Helen Flint, vice-president; Stella Sullivan, secretary-treasurer; Marjorie Holaday, reporter; and Harriett Garrett, chairman of the program committee.

The president-elect, Ruth Graham, talked to the old and new members on the ideals of the Forum, and the desire of the women who started the organization last year to make it take the place of the Roman forum among the women of the University.

In summarizing the history of the organization, she told of the primary plan to discuss alternatingly debate at one meeting and current events at the next. This system was adopted from that of the Agra, the forensic society at Wellesley, to which Miss Julia Burgess, professor of rhetoric in the University and friend of the Forum, belonged some years ago.

Walter L. Myers, a student in the University, showed the women present just how the debates of the last doughnut series might have been strengthened. In his criticism, he pointed out the value of quoting from authorities familiar to the audience and judges rather than unknown characters who have no appeal to the average public. He also cited the disadvantages of choosing a question in which much partisan spirit was involved, and discussed the difficulties incurred by this in the question which the men debated with the University of Washington last year.

LIEUT. J. C. BURGARD HERE

Oregon Man, Class of '16, Fought
Alongside Ben Dorris.

Following a period of active service on the front lines in France with the 91st Division, Lieutenant John Clark Burgard, '16, member of the Beta Theta Pi, returned to the campus Monday night for a few days' visit with friends in Eugene and on the University.

Lieutenant Burgard while fighting in the Argonne forest was wounded in the back and soon after in the chest, incapacitating him for further active duty. His place on the field of battle was taken by Lieutenant Ben Dorris, who also was wounded in a short time. Lieutenant Burgard is on sick leave from Camp Lewis at the present time. His brother, William Burgard, served with the 304th infantry and according to his brother was severely gassed just a few days before the armistice was signed. He is still in France.

CHAPLAIN MAY COME TO Y

Young Californian from Overseas is
Considered for Secretary.

Word was received yesterday by Herald White and Dr. A. E. Caswell, members of the campus Y. M. C. A. committee, from Gale Seaman, stating that D. E. Mullard, secretary of the Bremerton Y. M. C. A., will not take that place on the University campus. Mr. Seaman is the Pacific coast student secretary, with headquarters at Los Angeles.

Mr. Seaman recommended as secretary for the University a young chaplain just returned from overseas who is a graduate of the University of California. "He has had experience and training," said Mr. Seaman, "and there is a possibility that he may be obtained for a considerable period of service." The University Y. M. committee will make the decision before tomorrow.

The position of Y. M. C. A. secretary on the campus was left vacant when William F. Vance left a week ago to resume his duties as professor of history in the College of Idaho at Caldwell, Idaho. Mr. Vance had been the war secretary on the campus since last October.

Hollis Johnston and L. J. Ellis tied for first prize of \$25 worth of books offered annually by the Oregon Chapter, American Institute of Architects for the most consistent improvement. The prize was divided equally between them. Miss Marie Louise Allen gained the first prize of \$15 in books, and Hollis Johnston gained the second prize of \$10 in books, in the John McGuire prize offered each year for the best sketch problem. Judges were Joseph Jacobberger, president of the Oregon chapter A. I. A., and M. H. Whitehouse, chairman educational committee of Oregon chapter A. I. A.

Among the other problems judged, Hollis Johnston gained six first places, and L. J. Ellis and Horace Foulkes each gained two. The architectural students and their guests held a banquet at Friendly Hall last evening, at which Mrs. Mable Holmes Parsons spoke and musical numbers were given by Professor Paguy-Cote, Professor John Stark Evans and Mrs. Hollis Johnston. There were 45 students and their guests present.

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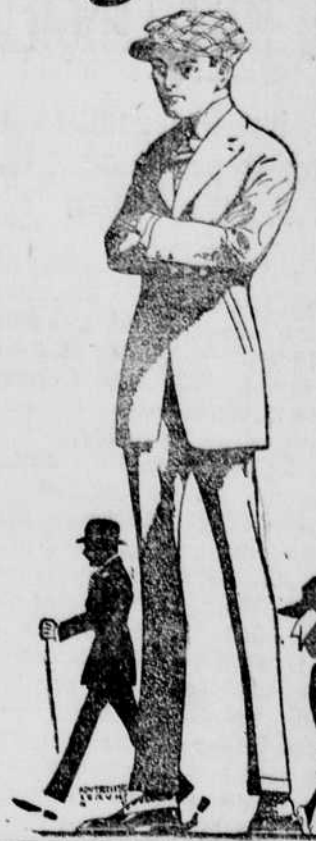

Work on Remodelling to be Done by
End of Week Says Walker.

Work on the remodeling of the drill shed into a gymnasium annex is fast nearing completion, and according to Graduate Manager Dean Walker the carpenters' work will be done by the end of this week. The erection of basketball goals and dividing the floor into basketball courts is all that will have to be done before the building is ready for use.

The structure is being finished in good time as the next few weeks will be the busiest part of the intra-mural athletic season. Besides the two inter-fraternity basketball championship games to be played soon, there are class basketball games and the newly arranged handball tournament. A wrestling schedule is being drawn up and the doughnut indoor baseball league is in an embryonic stage. The faculty also have a number of clashes to be arranged in the indoor sport line, according to Dean Walker. The instructors are taking a great deal of interest in their gymnasium classes and meet regularly every Thursday night, he says.

The remodeled structure will have the largest floor space of any building on the campus, and will offer ample space for every branch of indoor athletics.
