MILITARY TRAINING **BILL PASSES SENATE**

Measure Provides for High Schools and Colleges: Col. Leader in Charge.

Universal military training in the high schools and colleges of Oregon is made compulsory under the terms of a bill by Senator Hurley of Malheur county, which passed the senate yesterday afternoon by a vote of 16 to 14.

Colonel John Leader, who for the past year has been in charge of the officers' training camps at the University, will continue in that capacity and will also systematize the military training in the high schools if the bill becomes a law.

Senator Pierce attacked the bill, mainly because Colonel Leader is to have charge of the military work. He also demanded that the officers' training camp, which | the bill provides shall be located at Eugene, be changed to Corvallis. The camps were located at Eugene by the national military training camp association under the direction of the United States war

Letters come in almost daily from students in widely separated parts of the earth who are sending in the results of their work and asking for more.
