

COLLEGES TO FIGHT GERMAN INFLUENCE

Association of Professors Work to Make Education Free From Tuition.

The American Association of University Professors, in a letter just received at the president's office, asks the co-operation of the University in the task of placing American scholarship and learning upon an independent foundation free from German influence.

"The war has made us realize that science and scholarship our work has been dominated by German methods and ideas," says the letter. "This influence has been exercised, in no small degree, through the apparatus of scholarship which has been created and maintained by German industry. By this means, the Germans have not only placed themselves upon a position of superiority in relation to science and scholarship, but have exercised a far-reaching influence upon the development of thought throughout the world.

"The outcome of the war forces us to recognize that America must in the future share the responsibility of maintaining that extensive equipment of bibliographies, reports on the progress of studies, and systematic handbooks which constitutes the basis of all scientific work."

Plan to Publish Catalog

The American Association of University Professors, to eliminate this German influence in American intellectual life and to further the fullest development of American ideas and scholarship, is planning the publication of an International Catalogue of Humanistic Literature, which will take the place of all such bibliographical aids as have been issued in the field of humanistic study.

"The index will be inclusive and comprehensive in the fullest sense, both in regard to subject matter and to language," explains the association. "The list of periodicals, society publications, and governmental publications to be analyzed will be submitted for the criticism and approval of librarians and specialists. The index will be cumulative, in the form of the Readers' Guide to Periodical Literature, comprising monthly parts, with an annual bound volume covering a term of years.

Subjects of Publication

The subjects to be included in the new index are archaeology, history, geography, philology and literary history; classical and oriental studies; anthropology, ethnology, folklore, religion, philosophy, education, economics, political science, sociology; "the varying aspects of one comprehensive and co-ordinated study of man."

DANCING EXHIBITION SET FOR MARCH 14TH

Women's Physical Training Department will Feature Class Work Also.

The exhibition to be given by the women's physical training department March 14, in the men's gymnasium, will consist of a demonstration of the regular work taken by the freshmen, sophomore and advanced classes and the classes in folk dancing, according to Miss Catherine Winslow and Miss Gladys Gorman, who are in charge of the plans. No attempt is to be made to demonstrate unusual forms of exercise or dancing because the department wishes to display only the regular forms of Swedish work, including marching and floor work, apparatus work, games, and folk dancing.

The two freshman classes, containing 150 girls, will play games introduced on the gymnasium floor during the progress of the class hour. These games will be played in teams, the 150 girls appearing on the floor all at one time, however. This work will be under the direction of Miss Winslow.

An exhibition of Swedish work, marching and games will be given by the girls taking sophomore gymnasium. The advanced class, composed of the majors in the department, will demonstrate advanced marching and exercises, and apparatus work. Their instructor, Miss Gorman, will direct them.

The class in folk dancing will appear in the Dadi Dance, a Swedish folk dance, and Contra Marsch, a Danish dance. This class is quite large and the girls have begun work on their part of the exhibition. The aesthetic dancing class will give an interpretation of a Hungarian character dance, the Magyar, and the Shepherd Dance, from the suite of Edward German.
