"The index will be inclusive and comprehensive in the fullest sense, both in regard to subject matter and to language," explains the association. The list of periodicals, society publications, and governmental publications to be analyzed will be submitted for the criticism and approval of librarians and specialists. The index will be cumulative, in the form of the Readers' Guide to Periodical Literature, comprising monthly parts, with an annual bound volume covering a term of years.


