

# MANY FORMER STARS OF BASKETBALL OUT FOR VARSITY QUINTET

## Oregon's Outlook For Strong Lineup In Conference Games Bright

When the first call for varsity basketball men is made this weekend more experienced men will respond than ever before, which means that Oregon is going to figure big in conference circles this year. The schedule has been arranged, and Oregon will have about a month before its first game. The coach has not been selected by the athletic council, but it is to be decided upon by the athletic department and members of the basketball team. Rumor has it that Dean Walker, coach of last year's team, which won the Pacific Coast title, will probably handle the 1920 team.

Oregon is expected to have a strong team this year, but all of the conference teams will also rate high. Although Oregon won the championship last year, this year's five is expected to surpass the 1919 outfit. Every college team on the coast is expected to blossom forth with a galaxy of former stars. The pennant race this year will probably be the closest that has ever been witnessed on the coast.

### Four Last Year's Men Back

There is a wealth of material this year, as there are a number of varsity men of former years, four of last year's letter men, Eddie Durno, Nish Chapman, Herm Lind, Francis Jacobberger, as well as several of the cleverest of last year's frosh quintet are on deck.

Competition for places on the team is going to be keen as there are a number of good prospects who will be fighting for varsity positions. Eddie Durno is one of the best bets for forward. Last year was Eddie's first year on the varsity but he was rated as one of the best forwards on the coast. Herm Lind, captain of this year's team, held down the center position last year. Lind is an old standby and plays a steady, consistent game. Herm is fast and is one of the best basket tossers slated for the varsity squad. Nish Chapman, who played guard last season, was perhaps the best fighter of the 1919 bunch. Bill Steers was guard on the 1918 team, and is a likely candidate for one of the guard positions this year. Bill plays a game that is hard to beat and will run his competitors a merry chase for a berth on the team.

### Two '17 Men Back

Francis Jacobberger will report among the forwards, and is going to show a lot of class. "Skeet" Manerud is a whirlwind on the floor and his shooting ability made him the star of the 1919 frosh basketballers. He plays basketball with as much success as he does football, so someone is going to have to put up a real fight to keep him off the team. Francis Beller and Marc Latham looked good last year. Latham performed at center with the frosh and will be a varsity center candidate. Beller played a sterling game at guard last year. He looks like very promising material.

# CLINTON H. THIENES TO BE DELEGATE TO CONVENTION IN IOWA

## Former Eugenean to Represent U. of O. Medical School in Voluntary Movement

Portland, Dec. 1—(Special)—The election of Clinton H. Thienes as delegate to the Student Volunteer convention, to be held in Des Moines, during Christmas vacation closed the campaign at the University of Oregon School of Medicine which started last Tuesday. Richard Montgomery was elected alternate, and balloting was held to determine the order in which others will be selected, resulting as follows: Irene Hunt, Emaline Banks, Mildred McBride, Helen Ahrens, Anna Memby, Grace Young, Mrs. Jessie Farrier, and Mildred Dodge.

John Rudd, general secretary of county Y. M. C. A. work in Oregon and Idaho, and Miss Brown, northwest student Y. W. C. A. secretary, spoke Tuesday to the students on the need of foreign medical missionaries. Miss Brown laid special emphasis upon the need for women. The need is so great, she said, that special inducements have been offered women delegates for medical schools, a ruling having been made declaring all of these women eligible to attend the convention. Eleven women attending medical school here are eligible to go, but only seven or eight will be able to do so, according to Clinton Thienes, chairman of the committee in charge of the movement here. Students who volunteered were Emaline Banks, Lester Jones, Ray Hausler, Frank Campbell, Harold Foskitt, and Mr. Christopher.

The committee plans to raise the necessary funds from the students, faculty, churches and downtown doctors. An effort will be made to raise \$700 and if this amount is obtained seven delegates may attend the convention as representatives of the Portland school.
