805 Men, 718 Women Register; Commerce Leads In Numbers

The registration thus far this quarter has not reached the mark expected, the number being only 1523. At this time last year there were

1108 students. There are 87 more men than wo-The total number of men is 805; the number of women, 718.

Students now registered who were not here last quarter total 164, but of these 87 have been enrolled in the University previously.

The most popular courses in the University seem to be commerce. zoology, English and journalism. There are six fewer majors in the school of commerce this quarter than were registered the second quarter of last year. In zoology there are 58 more, making a total of 226. The school of journalism has about 120 nounced in the near future. majors, about twice as many as were registered last year.
