ARTILLERY OFFICER VISITS

Lieut. A. W. Jones of Camp Lewis Praises Oregon Students

Oregon students possess an unusual amount of democratic spirit, energy and pep, according to Lieut. A. W. Jones, of the 55th company C. A. C., stationed at Camp Lewis who is a visitor on the campus.

Lieutenant Jones who is a graduate of the class of 1916 of the University of California, is spending his first visit on the Oregon campus, and was high in his praise of Oregon standards as he has seen them during his visit.

The visitor had a year's service overseas as a member of the American Artillery Park. He was on the front line from September 1918 until the signing of the armistice and went through the battle of St. Mihiel, Oise-Aisne and Meuse-Argonne. The 55th company C. A. C. with which he is now connected was in the front lines from August 6, 1918, until the signing of the armistice.

75 HIGH SCHOOLS TO ARGUE IN STATEWIDE DEBATE TOURNAMENT

Preliminary Discussions Start Friday In Eleven Districts

Seventy-five high schools of this state are represented this year in the Oregon High School Debating League, a decided increase over the membership of last year, according to the reports from the directors of the 11 districts received by Robert W. Prescott, of the department of public speaking.

Beginning last night, January 30, debates will be held throughout the state on the subjects selected in the various districts, the last ones being scheduled for late in February. The first arguments between teams of the South Willamette district, a schedule for which has been filed by C. A. Howard, of Eugene, director of that district, will be held February 5, when Junction City meets Elmira and the University high meets the Eugene city high school team. The winners in these contests will meet February 20. No dates have been set as yet for a meeting between Roseburg and Myrtle Creek, the winner of which will meet the winning team of the quadrangle of Lane County.

A new president, Superintendent C. W. Boettcher of Albany, was elected at a meeting of the directors in Portland during the State Teachers' Association this winter to succeed Superintendent George Hug of McMinnville.

DELEGATES PLAN CLASSES

STUDENTS TO CONTINUE WORK OF DES MOINES MEETING

Messages Brought by Leaders of Student Volunteer Movement Will Be Discussed

Delegates from the University of Oregon to the Des Moines convention are planning to hold popular World Forum meetings in the Y. M. hut, beginning Sunday afternoon, February 1, and continuing through a series of six meetings. Topics for discussion will include some of the more important world problems which were presented at the convention by the great leaders of the Student Volunteer movement.

The members of the Oregon delegation feel that the convention was a big thing, and that they derived much personal benefit from it. The present series of World Forum gatherings is an attempt through open discussion and questioning to bring a part of the Des Moines message back to the students whose loyal support made the trip possible for them.

Evening classes for the study and discussion of world problems have also been organized. Of these, the men's class, "The Call of a World Task", and the class in "Medical Missions" for both men and women will not begin until the first week in February and will cover only a six week period instead of eight as previously announced.

PUBLISHER DONATES BOOK

"Discoveries and Inventions" Added to Homer Collection

Because he was impressed well Oregon's showing at the big New Year's game with Harvard, John Howell, a book publisher of San Francisco sent a book to the Homer collection of the University library giving the publication "Discoveries and Inventions" a hereto unpublished lecture by Abraham Lincoln given in 1860, to Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Burden, of Eugene, on their way back from the game. Mr. Burden, it will be remembered, was formerly physical instructor for men at the University, and it was while he was seeking a book in San Francisco to add to the Homer collection that Mr. Howell became interested and gave the book to Mr. Burden.

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
