R.O.T.C. TERM EXAMS BEGIN

Summer Camp Starts June 10—Finals Necessary Now

About 20 men from the University including three non-commissioned officers, will attend the training camp at San Diego this summer. More than usual interest is being shown in the summer camp, according to Captain Baird, as the men are beginning to realize the value of the six weeks' training course. Railroad fare and food are paid for by the government and the only expense the men are under while in training is their "canteen money" for incidentals.
