FULL OF OREGON SPIRIT

Will Aid "Shy" In Coaching
Basketball Squad.

Bohler, Washington vs. Bohler, Oregon, it will be this year when Oregon meets W. S. C. in basketball, for F. M. Bohler, Oregon's new assistant instructor in the school of physical education who is to assist Shy in rounding the varsity basket tossers into shape when the training season starts next December, is a younger brother of "Doc" J. F. Bohler, head trainer at W. S. C.

Mr. Bohler arrived on the campus last week from the east and comes here filled with enthusiasm over Oregon's prospects for a successful year in athletics. His expression of this confidence in the strength of Oregon's teams to be crystallized in his statement that he considers Oregon "the most desirable college on the coast" in which to follow his line of work.

Prominent As Athlete.
If you glance through the files of this paper for the years 1912 to 1914 you may find that Bohler was prominent during those years as a cougar athlete not only in basketball, in which he starred at guard through three seasons, but also in football and baseball. He graduated from his alma mater in 1914 and since that time has had experience in the east as a coach and physical director.

During the recent war he held a first lieutenant's commission in the regular army and after two and a half years of foreign service secured his discharge last December. He was in the Army of Occupation and after doing his part of "Die Wacht Am Rhein" was transferred to Antwerp, the scene of the recent Olympiad, as Assistant Provost Marshal.

Has Oregon Spirit.
His enthusiasm over the Lemon-Yellow's prospects for the coming year may be taken as proof that he has already felt the touch of "Oregon Spirit" and is prophetic for his success among the faculty and students at Oregon.

His work for the coming term will include the handling of the men's gym classes beside instruction in swimming and boxing.
