The influx of new faculty members, the addition of a number of new offices on the campus, and a general spurt of building throughout the city created such a demand for wire connections that the supply of instruments on hand was speedily exhausted.

> Orders have been placed with the manufacturers for a new supply but according to advices received from them it will be several months before shipments can be made. Approximately 150 telephones will be needed to remedy the shortage.
