### GIVE THE BAND AN INCENTIVE.

There are at present about fifty men in the University capable of forming a University band which would equal if not excel that of any other institution on the coast. At present, in spite of the urgent calls from the student body, no permanent organization has been effected by these men, although a large number of them voluntarily played during the Multnomah game.

Leaders of the movement to organize a representative University band say that it is impossible to do so unless these men have some incentive to induce them to play at yell practices and at games. These men must have some reward for the time they put in practicing, say the leaders, before any organization can be effected.

It has been many years since the University of Oregon has boasted a real student band. Oregon men will freely admit that rival institutions have boasted bands which far outshined the organization representing their own institution. Other colleges have adopted some means of rewarding the players for their work and time, they make their men feel that to be a member of the University band is a real honor.

If loyalty and devotion to Oregon have failed to produce a band, and it seems it has, the band men must be offered a proper incentive, such as a pin, an emblem, or perhaps a sweater. But the associated students should not offer such a reward to the band unless they are assured that a real representative band will result. The band men must first organize.

The Emerald does not doubt that the associated students will see fit to offer some reward to the members of the band at the end of the year. The men need some reward for the services they render the student body, they deserve it, and they must have it. However low the finances of the associated students may be, the University cannot afford to be without a band.
