## 9 STATE LOANS MADE

### Ex-Service Men Take Much of Government Aid.

Nine ex-service men have already taken advantage of the \$50 loan offered to ex-service students by the Oregon Soldiers and Sailors Commission, according to a report from the business office yesterday. Several others have also applied and are now filling out necessary forms before sending to the Commissioner in Portland through the medium of the business office. The loan this year is similar to the one offered by the Commission last year except that one man may receive only one loan and there is to be no extension of time after the note falls due. All loans are due on or before January 1, 1921.

The reason for this change as stated in a letter to Registrar Spencer from F. W. Mulkey, chairman of the Commission, is that last year it was felt that up to the beginning of the school year, in 1919 a great many men had not had time to adjust themselves to conditions, owing to the fact that they had been but recently discharged from service. Conditions are now different and in order to accommodate as many worthy students as possible a new method has been established in the form of a revolving fund. This method of aiding the men makes it necessary that the loans shall be paid as soon as they are due in or-

der that another student just as deserving may be accommodated by the Commission.

The forms filled out by the men in applying for the loan are questionnaires stating all possible information in regard to the history and worthiness of the applicant. All must be approved by the Registrar, President and Dean.

## Frosh and Varsity To Mix On Gridiron

Frosh eleven in 1916, and who is out this year for the first time since then appears to be the only backfield man who is sure of his position. And even "Bill" may be nosed out yet. Rinehart showed himself to be a "fit man to fill big 'Bill' Steers shoes" in the game against Multnomah last Saturday, according to Portland sport writers who witnessed the game. "Bill" played a good game against the clubmen and proved his ability to pilot the team through the pinches.

The line positions are still about as much up in the air as before and Coach Huntington has not given out any information as to what he will do in the line selections yet. "Spike" Leslie, and his brother "Brick" appear to be on the first string to stay as does "Mart" Howard at left end. The other positions are still at stake. "Brick" Leslie holds down the pivot position on the lemon-yellow eleven and although one of the lightest men on the line seldom fails to stop any plays that come his way.

**Varsity Shows Improvements.**  
"Spike" is holding down his old position at left tackle and is doing most of the punting this season. "Mart" Howard is playing better football this year than he did last and will make a name for himself in conference circles this season if he keeps up his present pace.

Assistant Coach "Bart" Spellman left yesterday for Moscow, where he will get a line on the University of Idaho eleven in their game with the Washington State College team there this afternoon. Little is known of Idaho's strength and they may spring a surprise in the game.

According to Coach Huntington the Varsity is beginning to show a great deal of improvement in practice workouts and should be going good by this time next week. There is still a great deal of rough edging work to be done. The team is not in shape to go into a conference game but they are appearing much faster and working better than before. "Speed is now the main object" Huntington said last night, "and we have got to develop it."
