Nevertheless, such action on the part of Oregon students is to be condemned. Although we do not "boast of our culture" we should demonstrate to publications which judge the culture of an institution by the actions of its students at a football game, that we do receive culture at Oregon.

The students of the University sincerely apologize to the highly-offended Barometer for the unpremeditated outburst of spirit. But the editorial referred to might have caused more unfriendly feeling among new students who do not understand the friendly rivalry existing between the two great state institutions than a hundred such trivial displays of unwise rooting.

The Emerald assures the Barometer that inhospitable rooting and booing of O. A. C. men who attend Oregon games will not happen again. 
