## BOND ISSUE PLANNED FOR MUSIC BUILDING

The prospectus says that in contrast to the other schools comprising the University, the School of Music is a going, revenue-producing concern, and has always been entirely self-supporting, the fees from music students this year will reach at least \$25,000, and part of this annual revenue goes into a fund for the purchase of additional equipment. Since the School of Music in addition to work of training students in piano, voice, violin, orchestra, etc., serves the musical interests of the state in many ways, the University assists in its maintenance by providing overhead expenses and certain administration services.

### Officers Business Men.

The officers of the University of Oregon Holding company expect to float much of the bond issue in the city of Eugene, for in addition to being a sound financial investment the city will benefit to the extent that the entire amount subscribed will be retained in Eugene in the form of a new building that will become increasingly valuable both to the University and the public. The bonds may, however, be offered on the Portland market also.
