

TAGS TO DISTINGUISH STUDENTS AND ALUMNI

**Green for Undergraduates;
Brown on Visitors.**

Green and brown tags will be the means of identification of students and alumni members during Homecoming week-end, according to information given out by John Houston, chairman of the committee in charge of the arrangements. The green tags with red letters will be worn by the students, while the alumni tags will be brown in the form of miniature footballs and will be lettered in yellow.

The alumni tags will be given out at a booth located on the corner of Fifth and Willamette streets down town and also at a booth in Johnson Hall. Students will get their tags at their different living organizations and at the last assembly preceding Homecoming.

All housing organizations are urged by Houston, to make up the dance programs for their guests at the annual Homecoming dance. In previous years a great deal of confusion has been caused by the fact that this little detail has been overlooked and it is planned to have it eliminated this year if possible.

A meeting of all the Homecoming committees will be held Thursday evening at 7:30 o'clock, in Dean Straub's room in Johnson Hall, according to general chairman Houston. Plans will be discussed and the complete program of events outlined.

Dillehunt, dean of the University of Oregon medical school, and Dr. Harry Beal Torrey, head of the department of zoology and director of medical research in the University, were authorized to go to New York to confer with representatives of the General Education Board in regard to co-operation between it and the University school of medicine.

Guard "Slim" Johnson may not be able to play. Coach Bartlett also said that he probably would shift Halfback Jordan to an end for the game.

The Chemawa men should have a good team this year, as they have had the advantage of a good coach. Emil Hauser is coaching the team as well as playing one of the ends. Hauser played with Carlisle and with O. A. C. formerly.

The Oregon lineup will probably be about the same as that which started the game against Pacific University last week, with a few changes due to injuries.
