Many Colds, Results of Carelessness, Being Treated

No influenza whatever, and only a few cases of fever have been treated at the infirmary so far this year. Colds, however, are plentiful. More colds are being treated this year than last, probably owing to weather conditions.

Ninety per cent of these colds, according to Dr. E. H. Sawyer, University physician, are the result of carelessness on the part of the student, especially as regards over-exposure on rainy evenings. He suggests three preventatives—go to bed early; keep feet as dry as possible, and don't get over-heated.

"There is no necessity," Dr. Sawyer asserts, "for a cold hanging on for three or four weeks. Come over to the infirmary and get something for it; then go home and stay in bed for a day, or even two days, and you will get up feeling fine."

The University health department is attempting to standardize the heat in the various classrooms and in the library. This will eliminate many colds caused by students going from a warm room to a cold one, or vice versa.
