"Gee, I knew I was going to stammer and get nervous," remarked one of the Portias, when she came out of the court room where she had spent two hours with other attorneys who were involved in the case. Most of them were too excited to discuss the possible outcome. As is customary (probably not in actual practice) they shook hands with each other and complimented the other for the good fight put up by her.
