

# O. A. C. HELD TO TIE IN SOCCER BATTLE

## Outplayed, Outplayed, Oregon Fights on Defensive.

### RETURN GAME DEC. 4TH

#### Team Put Through Stiff Work By Coach Dymont.

With the help of "Hay" Schmeer and an abundance of fight the Oregon soccer team succeeded in holding the skilled O. A. C. representatives of the Scotch national game to a scoreless tie on the slippery turf in Corvallis Saturday morning. A great crowd of spectators completely encircled the field.

Outplayed, but not outfought, the Oregon men were forced to resort to a defensive game early in the fracas. On numerous occasions goaltender Schmeer prevented Coach Wiltshire's adept proteges from scoring by his brilliant playing. In commenting upon the playing after the game, Coach Dymont, who has taken part in many soccer contests both in the United States and in Canada, said that "Hay" Schmeer's work under the goal posts in the Aggie battle was some of the best he had ever seen.

Coach Dymont expressed his approval of the showing made by the squad and looks upon the tie score as a victory, for the advance dope said the Aggies were to beat Oregon by three or four goals. "The boys won their game by fighting," said Coach Dymont. "O. A. C. had the better team."

#### Injuries Are Slight.

On Oregon's backfield fell the barrage of the O. A. C. attacks. Time and again the clever passing and footwork of the O. A. C. forwards brought the ball into Oregon territory, only to have it shot back into deep centre by Schmeer or the backs. "Heinie" Koerber and Patterson, fullbacks, were worked hard but played a stellar game.

The well-balanced Aggie team worked consistently, but lacked the punch to penetrate the Oregon backs. Their forwards were able to make but few direct speedy shots at the goal. Snook, the O. A. C. track man, traveled the outside right territory with his usual rapidity, and his accurate toe was ever a menace to the Oregon team. "Blighty" Marfield and "Ted" Bryant in the fullback positions and "Pranky" Jones at right half back, starred for O. A. C.

#### Injuries Are Slight.

The forwards who started the game for Oregon were: Byers, McPherson, Tnerck, King and Brogan. Ingle, Madden and Statton started the game at halfback. Patterson and Koerber held down the fullback berths, and Schmeer guarded the goal. At the end of the first half, Capps, Potter and "Hub" Jacobberger replaced McPherson, Brogan and Ingle. McPherson, who played inside right, sprained an ankle, and Ingle suffered a bruised instep.

O. A. C. is to play a return game with Oregon on December 4. Realizing that the team must practice consistently if it hopes to hold the Aggie squad again, Coach Dymont will put his team through stiff workouts every evening of school days.

### PLANS FOR NEAR EAST RELIEF DRIVE MADE

Mrs. S. D. Allen to Speak Monday, Nov. 29, From Experience Among Persian Refugees.

The Near East Relief drive, which is to be launched the first of December is to be started on the campus by an address by Mrs. S. D. Allen next Monday evening, Nov. 29, at 7:30 in Villard hall. Mrs. Allen was stationed in Urumiah, Persia, at the time when 80,000 refugees were concentrated in the missionary compound there, she also spent two years with deportees and saw thousands of tragedies upon which she will base her appeal for support in the drive.

According to Miss Alice Capps, county chairman, the drive on the campus will be conducted through the various campus organizations. Definite plans are being completed by the committee for the carrying on of the campaign. The quota for Lane county is \$6000, and Eugene \$3000. The campus quota has not yet been decided. It is hoped that groups of students will club together and pay \$60 a year for the support of an orphan or refugee child.
