

FROSH WIN TWO OUT OF THREE CONTESTS

Defeat Pacific University and O. A. C. Rooks.

BACKFIELD MEN SHINE

Good Prospects for Next Year's Varsity Uncovered.

Two out of three games won and the third lost by the narrow margin of one point is the record made by the freshman football team which closed a very successful season by defeating the O. A. C. Rooks in the final game. All through the season they played good football, and their work was far above that of the average Frosh team.

The Frosh had a special advantage in having two coaches as good as "Ken" Bartlett and "Baz" Williams. Each was a football man at the University in former years, both playing on the varsity team which defeated Penn at Pasadena in 1916 and the one which played against Harvard in 1920. Bartlett handled the backfield work for the Frosh while "Baz" worked with the linemen.

Coaches Are Handicapped.
The coaches were handicapped by the fact that there were so many new men to work with it was impossible to get a line on the ability of each man until the season was well advanced. For this reason there were many shifts, and the final line-up was not evolved until shortly before the game with the Rooks. Another factor which will aid the frosh next year when they try for varsity positions will be that Bartlett and Williams both played the style of game that Huntington teaches and the frosh will not have to begin all over, and learn a new system.

The first real game of the season for the freshmen was the one with Pacific at Eugene. The week before Pacific had succeeded in beating the Rooks. The Frosh were able to send them home on the short end of 24 to 7 score. The second game was lost to Chemawa. The Frosh played the Indians on their own field and lost 10 to 9. The Indians were able to put over the winning score shortly before the end of the game. There was little dope out prior to the Frosh-Rook contest as the Rooks had beaten Chemawa who had won from Oregon and the Frosh had beaten the Pacific "U" men who had defeated the Rooks. The game was played in Eugene Armistice day and was won by the Frosh 13 to 0. It was a battle from start to finish, neither team slackening until the final whistle.

Backfield Is Strong.

There are a number of men on the Frosh team who will have good chances at the varsity next year. It is undoubtedly a fact that the Frosh backfield was far better than the line. At the end of the season the line was beginning to hold, but it was the backfield that won the games. For first year men the backs played very well. They were not afraid to dive on interference, and when they carried the ball they charged for all they were worth. Halfback Parsons looks good for next year. He is a twisting, squirming, plunging back, heavy enough so that he is very hard to down and he is never down until several men of the other team are sitting on his chest. He is equally good at broken field running and at line bucking. And he can also kick fairly well.

Burton is another good halfback prospect for the varsity. He was out of game with an injured shoulder during the first part of the season and no one knew what he could do. When he did get into the game though everyone recognized him as a real player. His punts averaged about 35 yards, and he is a good line plunger. His greatest handicap is his lack of weight. Burton was the captain of the Frosh aggregation this season. Chapman was the quarter for the team. He is a heady player, shifty and fast and knows how to run the team. He is a brother of "Nish" Chapman, Oregon's varsity left half of this year.

Johnson Good at Center.

Johnson was the full back and he is also a good man. His greatest fault seems to be in his lack of ability to follow his interference. He hits like a ton of brick, but he is liable to run against a solid wall, instead of picking the hole. "Bill" Johnson at center looks good to fill the shoes of "Brick" Leslie next year. "Bill" has had lots of football experience and shows it. He played like a veteran this year, and was far the best Frosh center. The other linemen are not so good. They were all fighters and several of them may make good with more experience, but they did not show the class of the backs. Kel King, at tackle, was one that was good. He is big and a fighter from the whistle. Digman at end also has a good chance. His handicap is that he is not fast enough.

If he can only gain a little speed he will make good. Whipple at the other end was handicapped by his size. He is small for the varsity. McKeown at guard may have a chance after he learns the game. He is big enough, weighing over 200, but he is inexperienced. Coach Bartlett said that he was well satisfied with the way the Frosh played this year.

DOUGLASS AUTHOR OF TESTS.

Professor Earl R. Douglass, director of the University high school, is the author of an achievement test in algebra, for high schools. The test is desired from trials with 958 students in 14 high schools, in five states. It is now being published, and will be handled through the bureau of educational tests, under the direction of Dr. C. A. Gregory, professor of education.
