National Secretary Speaks.

Miss Ruth Benson, one of the national secretaries, with headquarters in Seattle, told of the growth of the Y. W. C. A. work throughout the world during the past year. A new department has been created with three secretaries who are supposed to become personally acquainted with the 1200 foreign girls in schools in the United States. Their work is to establish a more friendly relation with these foreign girls.

The classes in nursing that have been established in China by the Y. W. C. A. have had marvelous results, said Miss Benson enthusiastically. A \$20,000 Industrial home has been built in Japan by Japanese people in New York which is in charge of the association.

She told of an experience of one of the secretaries who one day met a girl evidently in much trouble. When she asked her what was the matter and tried to comfort her the girl said "You must be one of them Y. W. secretaries." This was a great tribute to the association, said Miss Benson. In closing she gave some ideas expressed by girls belonging to the girls' reserve.

"Service is doing a thing when you are asked to do it," "Loyalty to friends is sticking up for them," and graciousness is "when you want to show off not having to put on." These were definitions given by these girls.



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
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RUNQUIST TO LEAVE

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
