

Y. M. C. A. CAMPAIGN OPENS

RED AND BLUE TEAMS OUT TO GARNER SHEKELS

Coming of Noted Chicago Man to be Secretary Said to Depend On Success of Drive

Men who made pledges last spring, and all freshmen and others who were not here at that time are in a fair way to get rid of some money, as the Y. M. C. A. campaign for funds is now under way. The drive started at noon yesterday, when the solicitors met at lunch in the "hut" and complete plans were laid for the two days' campaign, which will close Wednesday at noon.

Two teams, the reds and the blues, with Carl Vonder Ahe and Roy Veatch as captains, are competing for the honor of bringing in the largest amount of money. Each team is made up of twelve men, with a man from each of seven fraternity houses, one from Friendly hall, and four from the campus at large. No one will be missed, and the students are expected to back the campus organization with their money.

Membership cards will be given to all who pay in the money now. If any men are unable to make payment immediately, they will be given an opportunity to sign pledge cards, payable at some time during the present term.

Whether the University of Oregon gets L. P. Putnam of the central "Y" at Chicago depends largely on the support given to the present campaign.

A small green ribbon is to be used to designate those who have "come through." All men should wear these, as they are the only means of keeping from being solicited a number of times.

The "Y" serves any student who requests aid. Employment, rooms, campus new student service, handbook publication, community service, "Y" school courses, and many other functions of the organization illustrate its usefulness. Several social events will be put on during the year. The annual stag mix, which was staged last Friday night, was a success in getting freshmen acquainted and started off right as students of Oregon.
