During the rest of the period the Chemawa aggregation picked up, pushing the frosh down the field for a time, but were unable to keep it up long enough to cross the goal line. Haak ended 7-0.

In the second quarter the freshmen got under way, ploughing down the field by line bucks and long runs. French made another end run for 20 yards, following it shortly afterward by a 25-yard run through left tackle for the second touchdown. Haak kicked goal.

Shortly after the kickoff Sutton frosh left half, got away for a 55-yard run for a touchdown. Haak converted the goal. Before the end of the half Sutton made another run for a 25-yard gain around end. The half ended with the score 21-0 for the frosh.

Indians Take on New Life

The Chemawa team came back on the field with a lot of new pep in the third quarter and it looked as though they were going to score. At the opening of the period the frosh played a superior game, making good yardage through the Indian line, but were finally held for yardage in the center of the field. By a long run Chemawa returned the frosh punt to the 15-yard line. There, however, they ran up against a stone wall, losing the ball on vardage. Jacobberger punted and Chemawa was stopped in the center of the field. By a series of passes, Chemawa worked the ball down to its former position on the 15-yard line. The Indians attempted a pass which was intercepted by Smith, who returned the ball to the center of the field before being tackled. Thus ended the third quarter with no gains for either side. Palefaces Join Indian Lineup

The last quarter merged into something between a regular practice and a comedy. Chemawa ran out of substitutes, and it looked as though the game might be called to a halt, but Baz generously offered the use of a couple of his subs. "Bill" Hart and Williams took their places in the Indian lineup relieving each other at right tackle, amid much wit hurled in their general direction from the grandstand. Two more touchdowns were annexed by the freshmen during the quarter,
