"The bonfire committee has been relying on class spirit to bring the men out" he said, "but there doesn't

seem to be any such spirit, so more drastic measures will be employed until the fire is finished."

"Any freshman seen on the campus from now on till after the fire is finished, without an important engagement, or some good excuse, will be taken to the field by upperclassmen and forced to put in a certain amount of work on the fire" said W. H. Metcalf, president of the frosh class.

According to President Bartholomew the fire is the slowest getting started of any for years, and will never be a success unless more freshmen turn out. The frosh men are warned to wear their old clothes in the future, so they will be prepared to work during the time not spent at classes.

All frosh must watch the bulletin board on Kincaid field, for lists of names of 60 men to report each night in the future.
