

DRAMATICS DEPARTMENT TO STAGE "PYGMALION"

Play to be Produced Under
Auspices of Elks

POOR TO BE BENEFITTED

Success of Last Year to be
Repeated by Same Cast

On Thursday and Friday of this week "Pygmalion," one of George Bernard Shaw's most successful comedies, will be produced in the Eugene theatre by the dramatics department of the University. This play was produced last year and proved to be one of the most successful plays ever shown on the campus. Professor Fergus Reddie, head of the department of drama; Madam Rose McGrew, head of the voice department in the school of music, and Charlotte Banfield, professor in the department of drama, will play the leading roles as they did last year. Nearly all of the students in the cast are members of last year's company and have done exceptionally good work on the Guild Hall stage.

Theatre Crowded Last Year

The play is being produced under the auspices of the Elks lodge, and the funds received from it are to help make up the Elks Christmas Cheer Fund which will bring happiness to many poor families in Lane county. It is expected that many faculty members and students on the campus will be interested in seeing the play again, because it met with exceptional success on the campus; also many were turned away at that time because of the smallness of the Guild Hall theatre.

Professor Higgins, played by Fergus Reddie, has made the art of teaching people to talk correctly his profession. He made a bet with Colonel Dickerson, his best friend and fellow bachelor, that he can change a flower-girl, picked up from the streets, to such an extent that she will pass for a duchess.

Mme. McGrew Plays Mother

He does it, but completely forgets that the flower-girl has feelings of her own and does not thoroughly enjoy the experiment. The part of the girl is played by Miss Banfield. Darrell Larsen plays the part of Colonel Dickerson. Madame Rose McGrew, who has had years of experience in grand opera, plays the part of the professor's mother.

Claire Keeney who has grown to be a dramatic favorite on the campus, will be seen again as Mr. Eynsford Hill, a person who comes from a very wealthy family and who perhaps marries Miss Doolittle, the changed flower-girl.

The other members of the cast are: Miss Eynsford Hill, Irene Steward, Mrs. Eynsford Hill, Hildegarde Repenin, Mr. Doolittle, Norvell Thompson, and the maid, Mabel Gilham.
