

GUILD HALL PLAY HAS EFFECTS OF FAIRY MAGIC

Ghosts Walk in Production of "Swanwhite"

LORNA COOLIDGE HAS LEAD

Special Matinee This Afternoon at Four O'clock

A combination of many bits of magic, bright colored costumes, a delightful medieval setting, and the clever work of the members of the junior company made "Swanwhite," the fairy fantasy produced in Guild hall Wednesday and Thursday nights, a beautiful and fantastic production. Swanwhite, the beautiful princess, was played by Lorna Coolidge with great success. The play is different from the average production seen nowadays and it carried the audience into the land of fairy dreams.

The young prince who was sent from the king's court to prepare the way for the king who was to marry Swanwhite was played very artistically by Charles Fish. Much of the success of the play is owed to Virgil Mulkey, who with the help of other men in the department, worked out the many magic effects.

Lighting is Praised

The soft-colored lighting which added much to the fantastic effect of the play was the work of Henry Wastell. Not only was exceptionally good work done by Miss Coolidge and Fish, but Edwin Keech who played the father called away from home by war, did some very commendable work. The cruel stepmother with magic powers who could blunt swords and strew the floor with needles, but who could not separate two hearts which loved each other was played by Helen Enoch. The entire cast kept entirely within the spirit of the spectacular play.

The most noteworthy piece of magic work in the play was the appearance of two ghost mothers. Extremely weird effects were produced by the use of mirrors and plate glass. Three flowers opened and closed to prove the innocence of the princess and a large white swan flew across the stage several times. A swallow which built a nest in the corner of the room dropped a feather which turned into a key so the prison gate could be opened. A red rose wilted when the wicked stepmother entered the room.

Play Called Effective

It has been the custom of the dramatic department to produce a spectacular play every year near Christmas time and this Norwegian fantasy written by August Strindberg proved to be one of the most effective ones which has ever been given here. The play was entirely the work of the junior company under the direction of Fergus Reddie and Charlotte Banfield.
