STUDENTS TO VOTE ON

Minor Sports Charge to be Decided at Special Election; Two Thirds Majority Necessary

The amendment to the constitution of the associated student body, concerning fees for minor sports, will be voted on Wednesday, January 25, according to Norton Winnard, appointed by President Bartholomew to have charge of elections. The polls will be open from 9 a. m. until 3 p. m. This amendment was to have been voted on January 17, but had to be postponed as the office of the University comptroller had not been able to make out the ballot books at that time.

There is to be no electioneering in the vicinity of the polls, which is designated as Villard hall, says Winnard-There will be an inspector, clerk, and ballot distributor at the polls all the time. The amendment requires 300 votes, with a two-thirds majority of this number, in order to pass.
