Paragraph No. 3, Section 3 of Article IV; "To direct the entertainment of the visiting teams or any others who are guests of the

Paragraph No. 5, Section 3 of Article IV; "To assume charge of all other items of importance in which the students may be directly interested and which are not specifically ascribed to the executive council."

There are a few things in regard to maintaining the beauty of the campus which should not be overlooked now. Forty-four Book Collection on Negro Question Gift of Louise Boyd

A collection of 44 volumes on the negro question has been procured by the library from Miss Louise Boyd daughter of the late Reverend J. H. Boyd, who was formerly pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Portland.

The books are several years old, and go extensively into the various phases of the negro question, discussing the political, sociological, historical, and anthropological sides of the subject.

Dr. Boyd was for many years paster of the First Presbyterian church in Portland, and later resigned to take a chair in the McCormack Theological Seminary of Chicago. He died a few weeks ago in Chicago.
