New Plans for Doughnut Sports

The reduction of the number of games which will be played by each team in the doughnut basketball series by the formation of two leagues is a decided improvement. A serious objection to the series last year was that every team had to play every other team, making the schedule too heavy. The new plan submitted to the representatives of the houses by Coach Bohler will make it possible for more men to take part in the games and will insure better attendance at more important contests.

Another good feature of the plan for intramural athletics this year is that no man will be allowed to drop varsity athletics and take up doughnut sports without the consent of the coaches. The directors of doughnut athletics are wise to co-operate with the varsity coaches in this matter, since there is some temptation for the varsity scrub to turn in his suit and star for his house basketball team. Varsity athletics come first, and the men needed there should turn out there. Then if the coaches decide to drop them from the squad they may join their house teams.
